

As the warm weather comes we need to care for our gardens and do some property maintenance indoors and out. If you are interested in helping in any way contact Jon Warland at 519-846-5911.


Ministry Online



It is a reaction of fear. It is the primal response of "fight or flight." In processing the trauma of Good Friday, and living in the raw emotion of their grief, I sympathize with their response to run from the tomb in terror even while the angels were trying to announce some good news. The first recipients of this news couldn't hear it. They weren't ready to receive it yet. Sometimes that is how I feel when I encounter something new and unexpected.

During the Easter season we are invited to claim the promise of God's great act of deliverance. God, through Jesus Christ, has driven away the darkness and swallowed up the power of sin and death. It is a remarkable and unique event, that after centuries of being told and retold it has perhaps lost its raw edge of striking terror in our hearts, as it did for those women who were the first to encounter the news of Jesus' resurrection. This news has become as domesticated as omelettes and coffee. We have had centuries to process the women's trauma and grief of the initial event and we now think of it all as rather mundane or normal. But there is nothing mundane or normal about the resurrection. It is God's great act of the undoing of death that we might be free to serve one another without fear. It is in this Easter promise that we are invited to imagine.

I pray that God sustain you by his grace and inspire you to opportunities of service and love that we might have a bold imagination for our future.
