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RECTOR'S REPORT

This year has been about living more fully into the four priorities of our vision. As we emerged out of the pandemic in 2023 life was about rebuilding our confidence to gather inperson and slowly we re-discovered the joys of being together again for liturgies, receptions, rehearsals, studies and fellowship.

It happened for me on Easter Sunday and then at the Coronation Evensong. Those were the significant moments at St. John's that we hadn't experienced since March 2020: a church full of people, joyfully gathering to be inspired and nourished as we celebrated the resurrection of our Lord on Easter Sunday and then the occasion of the Coronation of King Charles III in May. Those were memorable turning points for us.



"And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another." (Hebrews 10:25)

Appropriately and necessarily, the primary pillar of our vision is to **Proclaim the Love of Christ.** We do this in all kinds of ways as a gathered and sent community of faith. We gather faithfully and regularly in six different liturgical events, each of them with distinctive congregations: three liturgies on a Sunday morning, a monthly Evensong, a monthly Compline, and a weekly Wednesday liturgy. These liturgies and other seasonal festivals meant that our average weekly attendance in 2023 was 150 people. That is a clear indication of the confidence we have recovered to be together again.

This year we welcome 12 new people to St. John's.

"As you therefore have received Christ Jesus the Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving." (Colossians 2:6,7)

Learning opportunities allowed us to engage one another and deepen our faith:

- Lent Book Study on Patti Krawec's book, *Becoming Kin: An Indigenous Call to Unforgetting the Past and Reimagining our Future*;
- the series on Being Anglican and the study on the Gospel of Mark, both led by Rev'd John Lockyer;
- the fall book study on Brian McLearn's book, *Do I Stay Christian: a Guide for the Doubters, the Disappointed, and the Disillusioned*;
- the TRC learning and reflection group coordinated by Guinevere Kern;
- the Parish Retreat led by Canon Drew MacDonald on "Stages of Faith Development".

The Monday night Bible Study with residents of Portage is a gift of grace for all engaged. It has been faithfully led by Peter Scott (for 32 years), Dave Tinker (for 22 years) and Sharon Barrett (for 12 years). They are joined more recently by Rod Murray and Kimberley McGregor and they welcome more of you to become involved. That's over 60 years of faithful service and witness to the gospel in our community.



In all of this we are called to **engage and involve** people. The endlessly creative energy of the Knitters and Quilters embody this for us. The Orange Feather project in September, the Poppy Project in November, and the Christmas Puddings in December continues to engage people from the community and the region and become opportunities to build bridges for conversation.

I am delighted that Elizabeth Litch was honoured with the Florence Nightingale Award in July and Jurgen Petrenko was honoured with the Order of Niagara in October. Both Elizabeth and Jurgen are faithful witnesses to the love of God in our community and we rejoice with them.

The Patronal Festival, the Canada Day lemonade, the World Day of Prayer service, the Men's Dinner group, the livestream team, the Pancake Supper, Altar Guild, Flower Guild, Greeters and the Reader's Guild are ways to engage and involve people in the life of the parish, and they all require an immense amount of resources from parishioners to make it happen.

We are blessed with the work of our **musical** outreach under the capable and creative direction of Patrick Murray and Jurgen Petrenko. The ambitious number of concerts, the Elora Children's Choir - under Kate Wright's capable direction - the Song Circle with Stan Litch, the Volunteer Choir, the Compline Choir, the organ rebuild project, and our continued partnership with The Elora Festival and The Elora Singers continues to be a charism of the parish that engages people deeply. Thank you Patrick, Jurgen and the members of the Parish Choir for your leadership and commitment.





A courageous priority of our vision is the **Open Doors Project.** This year, with Vestry's approval and some architectural conceptual renderings, we began the process of seeking regulatory approvals from the diocese, the township, and the Bereavement Authority of Ontario. As you are aware, this is a big project and I am grateful for your engagement.

As we seek to fulfill the vision priority of Open Doors we are fine tuning costs, funding and grant sources to prepare for a Special Vestry. In all of this I am learning the importance of rooting the project in our baptismal vow of respecting the dignity of every human being. This is really important.



In conversations with people I hear views expressed of full endorsement, to views of caution, and views of resistance. We learn from one another in expressing our views because they all represent different perspectives.

When thinking about Open Doors Project it is important to remember that the goal is not only to bring our electrical, plumbing and HVAC systems up to a necessary level which can sustain the activities held in our historical buildings, but also to make our buildings accessible for people who cannot use our washrooms and reception space. As we serve our growing community and recognize the needs of our own demographic, it is clear that increasing numbers of people are excluded from our activities because of mobility challenges. We are becoming a community that privileges the able-bodied exclusively.



If our baptism vow calls us to respect the dignity of every human being, I believe that includes people in our midst with mobility challenges. The community at large needs an accessible space with commercial kitchen to address growing food security challenges and to provide a place to gather for receptions, book groups, service clubs and twelve step programs.

Thank you to Peter Barr and Colleen Murray who are co-chairing this project, and with Thomas Littlewood's creative support, capably guiding us through a complex process and carefully listening. It is imperative that we listen to one another in this process and thereby discern God's call for us as we seek to serve our community.

"And this is my prayer, that your love may overflow more and more with knowledge and full insight to help you to determine what is best, so that on the day of Christ you may be pure and blameless, having produced the harvest of righteousness that comes through

Jesus Christ for the glory and praise of God." (Philippians 1:9-11)

Beyond my work in the parish I continue, by Bishop's appointment, to serve as Regional Dean for the Greater Wellington Region and a coordinator of the Staring Well Program - a program to help orientate and support people in the first year of their ordained leadership roles.

It was sad to say farewell to Mardy and Walter Langford as they relocated to Ottawa in November.

I am grateful to our honorary assistants, Rev'd John Lockyer, Rev'd Judy Steers, and Canon Robert Hulse. Your support, wisdom and commitment is a gift.



To our staff team: Patrick, Jurgen, Thomas and Garry. You do your work with integrity and faithfulness, and it is always a joy to work alongside you.

Gratitude to our Wardens: Jeff, Pam, Jon and Jane; our Treasurer, Andrew; bookkeeper, Susan; bulletin creator, voicemail and email manager, Linda; and Columbarium coordinator, Pat. Thank you for your outstanding commitment that allows the parish to function administratively with grace.

ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT


I can't help but think that we're back! We had a full festival, a flurry of Christmas services, and many of our pre-pandemic gatherings and faith formation activities. It has been a joy to support you all and Paul in ministry here at St. John's.

On a personal note, Rebecca and I were so touched by your generous gift for our wedding and honeymoon. We had a wonderful time in New Zealand gallivanting around North Island in our very large camper van. Highlights included a boat ride to Cathedral Cove (pictured), beaches, wildlife, and fantastic seafood. We weren't able to make it to South Island, so we will need to go back!




Back at St. John's, much of my work this year has been concentrated on getting Safe Church acknowledgements signed, setting up a cloud-based document storage system, managing givings, and (increasingly) the Open Doors project. I wanted to spend the bulk of my report presenting some material that I think will be helpful as members of Vestry.

The graph below shows contributions to the various funds at the church: the general fund (blue), the choir fund (orange), monies raised at recitals (grey), and the total revenue (yellow). As you can see, donations are up significantly from last year-- **a total of 13%**. St. John's has 148 regular donors--that is donors that have given 5 times or more in 2023 and 275 individual donors. Our average weekly attendance for 2023 is 150, up 20 over 2022. This is a good news story! At Vestry, we will welcome 12 new members, and we welcomed 9 in 2022. The church is alive and well in Elora.



One of the quirks of our givings patterns at St. John's is that we receive almost a quarter of our yearly donations in the month of December. This is, in part, a reflection of our well-attended choral liturgies at that time of year. But it is something to think about when making your weekly contribution to the parish.



One of my goals this year was to resurrect the parish newsletter, *Common Supplications*. Two issues ran in 2023, and I'd like to have three in 2024. As parish administrator, I also work as clerk to Parish Council, Corporation, and the Open Doors team.

The Rector often says that we have the 'dream team' at St. John's Elora, and I think he's right. It's a pleasure to work with all of you, and with Patrick, Jurgen, and Garry. I look forward to more growth, more joy, and more spreading God's love in 2024.

WARDENS' REPORT

This Annual Report represents the work of hosts of volunteers, staff, and clergy over the last year. Thank you all for your ongoing commitment to St. John's.

This year, Bishop Susan Bell chose the theme of "Stewarding God's Gifts for Mission" as the theme for Synod—and that struck a chord here at St. John's. We have so many gifts to steward: financial resources, music, volunteers, relationships. All of these are given so that we can share God's love across Centre Wellington, and that's what we do at St. John's.

Proclaim the Love of Christ

This is our very foundation as Christians. We are called to bear witness to the Gospel and to show God's love to all we meet. At St. John's we do this through our regular livestreaming, our columbarium, the Portage ministry, and so many other initiatives. Everything we do—music, learning, reconciliation—are all done to the Glory of God.

2023 was the first year since 2019 that we were able to fully live into our liturgy and worship at St. John's. Christmas Eve services were a particular pleasure as that joy was curtailed in 2022 by a severe snow storm. Our own Jurgen Petrenko was awarded the Order of Niagara by Bishop Susan in recognition of his many years of dedicated service to St. John's and to the Diocese. Well done, Jurgen! Much deserved! Elizabeth Litch was awarded the Florence Nightingale Community Service Award by St. John's and the Elora Festival. We are blessed to have Elizabeth's textile arts as part of our 'fabric' at St. John's—Elizabeth created the seasonal banners on the wall near the organ and designed and created many of our altar frontals. Congratulations, Elizabeth! We are continually thankful for the Rev. John Lockyer and the Rev. Judy Steers for their ongoing commitment to our shared life.



Engage and Involve

Our livestream, which is so expertly managed by the Livestream Guild, is a critical pathway for engagement and mission. We know that many of our new people at St. John's come to us after having watched the livestream from home. This is indeed missional work. Thank you to Rod, Gerry, Heather, Jon, and Colleen for your dedication to this ministry.

The Coronation of King Charles III gave us an extraordinary chance to have a wonderful Coronation Evensong followed by our Patronal Luncheon. Many thanks to Pam Gradwell, Bob Cooper, and the Parish Choir for their hard work. It was a true feast!

We were nourished by the Rev. Canon Drew MacDonald at our Parish Retreat in October. Drew spoke passionately about the "Stages of Faith," and challenged us to grow and mature in our faith. The highlight, though, was a cake for the Rector's 60th birthday!



To improve our visibility in the community, we installed new signs in front of the church and on the Parish Centre. This will help people recognize who we are and where we are. Many thanks to Shirley Al for designing the signs and to the Sign Maker in Mount Forest for his professional work.

The Poppy Project grew again this year. We installed a 40-foot banner at the Wellington County Museum and Archives, and we continue to receive media attention for this wonderful project. The Knitters and Quilters have dedicated an enormous amount of time and energy into the Poppy Project over the last several years. As you'll see in their report, they're asking for more knitted/crocheted poppies to refresh the banners for this year.

The Knitters and Quilters also initiated a project to mark Truth and Reconciliation Day in September. With their guidance, parishioners were invited to tie a fabric feather onto a piece of netting which was then installed around the church to symbolize our commitment to Truth and Reconciliation. Feathers, especially eagle feathers, are deeply meaningful for many Indigenous nations. They represent a connection with the Creator and are often used in Indigenous ceremonies.

Musical Outreach

In the fall, Patrick launched an ambitious series of concerts in support of the musicians of the former Kitchener Waterloo Symphony. The concert series was very well received, and A Christmas in Wales was the highlight. The church was filled to capacity! The regular Compline liturgies continue, and Patrick has built a dedicated group of singers. On Good Friday, the Volunteer Choir joined with the Parish Choir to sing the liturgy, and it was wonderful to see both choirs together.

We were also blessed to have three new members of the Parish Choir join us in September: Rachel Barreca, Jennifer Krabbe, and Sharang Sharma. They, along with the rest of the Parish Choir, centre our worship in choral music and are so central to what we do at St. John's. With an eye to regularizing and standardizing our processes, we renegotiated all of the choir contracts this year to make sure that they were up to industry standard. We're looking forward to more opportunities to hear the Parish Choir outside of our liturgies later on this year.





Kate Wright has launched a very successful Children's Choir with over 20 enthusiastic youth. They premiered last year during the end-of-season choir concert, and it's a joy to have them in our church. We are looking forward to the Children's Choir participating in the liturgy on March 3, 2024. Thank you to Kate for her leadership on this project.

Another new musical initiative was launched this year. Stan Litch joins a group of singers in the Parish Centre on Fridays for the Song Circle.

Accompanied by Stan on his ukulele, this group sings songs old and new (mostly old), tells stories, and has a lot of fun doing it.

The Volunteer Choir sings two Sundays a month at the 9AM liturgy. They are an enthusiastic and talented group that brings joy and beauty to that liturgy.

The installation of the new organ console continues. The console itself has been in place for several months, but the new electronic stops have yet to be integrated. Jurgen is hopeful that the upgrades will be ready for a fanfare on Easter Sunday. In addition to a new organ console, we also installed upgraded microphones to enhance our livestream capabilities and to allow us to produce professional-grade recordings. The microphone wires are a bit obtrusive at present, but we are working on a solution.

Gratitude to Patrick, Jurgen, Stan, the Parish Choir, and the Volunteer Choir for living out this priority so well for us. We so appreciate your work, dedication, and time.

Open Doors

Much work has taken place on the Open Doors project. Peter Barr and Colleen Murray are capable co-Chairs, and they (along with the organizing team) are working hard to explore how to create an accessible, barrier-free church and reception space. This is about bringing to life our baptismal vow of protecting the dignity of all people.

Currently, the Open Doors team is refining the budget, and working with the municipality, the Diocese, and Bereavement Authority of Ontario. There is much work to do yet, and there will be several opportunities to learn, question, and pray about this part of our life together. There will also be at least two Special Vestries in the next year to approve various stages of the plan. In the meantime, if you have questions, please get in touch with Peter Barr, Colleen Murray, or the Rector.

Givings

The Church in Elora depends on your generous donations and financial support. Thomas has included some information about givings in the Administrator's Report, but it is important for the Wardens to highlight a few matters. First—we're growing! And we have much to be thankful for—and much work to do. To that end, as you will see in the 2024 budget, we rely on the generosity of those who have gone before us to fund our operations. That's what our endowment funds are for, but it is also important for current parishioners to support the operation of the parish. The Wardens invite you to prayerfully consider how you might be able to further your support to St. John's.

We are very grateful for the hard work and wise counsel of our Treasurer, Andrew Hirst.

Garry Cantlon, our sexton, does a huge amount of work behind the scenes to keep our buildings in tip-top shape. Thank you Garry! The upgraded sound system is working well, and we are investigating further work to improve the visual appeal and potentially install cameras to facilitate continuing

Livestream Guild

With the gradual return to in-person attendance at St John's, the Technology Team has adapted and revised the livestreaming of services, as well as the technology that is used to deliver them. We continue to have an active presence on Social Media.

Livestream Production


In April the Livestream station was moved to the back behind the pews and rewired to allow for the use of the Baptismal Font and return the seating to congregational use. In the Fall, we upgraded our microphones to deliver better quality sound from the chancel and sanctuary, as well as a high quality Digital Audio Converter and Recorder that delivers superior sound to the Switcher Studio software used to create the livestream. Patrick Murray coordinated the installation of these improvements.

The team met in September 2023 to determine whether there was adequate human resources to continue a weekly livestream and with the decision to recruit new volunteers to the team, the production of one weekly livestream continued. We also welcomed Heather Malek to the Tech Team. Her media experience has been an excellent addition. Scheduling one livestream per week has made better use of our team's human resources.

In 2022, while still in the throes of the Pandemic, real-time livestream viewership was 25-30. With the return to in-person attendance in 2023, typically 15-20 were watching. However, in the weeks following a livestream, many viewers from near and far continue to watch our services and often comment on their consistent high quality. Our Youtube channel, where livestreams are broadcast, grew from 319 to 384 subscribers. Subscribers receive immediate notification when a livestream begins. We believe this serves the needs of our immediate Parish community and beyond. As of January 2024, the channel has shown continued growth, now at 435 subscribers.

Social Media

A similar pattern of growth is apparent on our other Social Media platforms, Facebook and Instagram. They continue to provide information and engagement to Parish members and to the wider community. Regular content additions which feature photos, music, and messages from the Rector are always engaging with our audience. We have anecdotal reports of the impact of Social



Media on the Parish Community, including those who cannot attend due to variety of circumstances, increased engagement of viewers, and those for whom the content we provide is a stepping stone to further Parish involvement.

Another year has passed and what a year this has been. Life changing experiences for me happened this year and this amazing group stood by me and upheld me with their love and faith. I cannot say thank you enough for everyone's support. I am truly blessed to have all of you in my life.

We had 5 projects this year and managed somehow to do them all with everyone pulling together as a team to accomplish these goals.

Feathers for TRC Day The Knitters and Quilters were able to make over 300 feathers from cloth. The display was to remind us to reflect in a thoughtful way about the children who did not return home from Residential Schools in Canada. The event of hanging the feathers on netting for display became an interactive event with about 60 people participating. The display was very moving in a sacred way.



All Things Bright and Beautiful Sale We received generous donations of jewelry and scarves and purses from members of the church, so thank you for that. These donations became our inventory to sell at the All Things Bright and Beautiful Sale that was held at the end of September. The Knitters and Quilters sorted, organized, and sold these items and we managed to raise \$727.10 which we in turn donated to the Choir Fund. A big thank you to everyone for supporting us in this endeavour. This sale may become an annual event.



Poppies The poppy display has become a tradition at St. John's as well as in and around Elora and Fergus. This year our group expanded our display by creating a banner for the columbarium, a forty-foot display for the Wellington Museum front steps, and added two new hangings for the downtown area in Elora. Our inventory of poppies is depleted, so please consider making more poppies for us as we can hardly wait to hear what Paul has in mind for this year. So, a huge thank you to the ladies who helped make and mount these poppies for display.

Christmas Puddings This was the project that almost did not happen. Life enveloped me and made organizing a challenge. We were going to make the puddings, and then not, but after I found out that all the dried fruit from my Mennonite grocer was, ready the puddings were back on. A big thank you to everyone who pitched in to make 110 pounds of puddings. I took over 30 of the puddings to Florida and they were just about all presold before we arrived. The feedback I got from people here who purchased the puddings here was that they were delicious. Jane-Anne Murray and Pam Gradwell coordinated the sale of the puddings, and the great news is that we sold all of them and cleared close to \$2000.00 after expenses. We were able to maintain our prices even though our costs have risen. Again, thank you for supporting us by purchasing puddings and we will be back this year to share in another St. John's Christmas tradition. So start now saving 28 and 14 oz cans (828 and 414 ml) and bringing them to the church. They make great baking tins.

Prayer Shawls and Comfort Blankets

continue to make the shawls and comfort blankets and a lot the blankets have gone to Hospice care in Guelph. Portage

The Portage Ministry holds a Bible Study on Monday evenings at Portage, continuing under the leadership of Dave Tinker, Peter Scott, Rod Murray, Sharon Barrett and Kimberly McGregor. Late in the year, Kimberly stepped down from the role and we thank her for her support for the Girl's Study over the past years.

We met in-person on a regular basis this year with an occasional cancellation due to illness on site. Senior staff have been supportive and continue to see the role of outside volunteers as part of the residents' program.

A typical Monday meeting includes an opening prayer, offered by one of the residents, followed by singing. Using "Our Daily Bread" the passage and notes are read aloud. The residents are keen to listen, discuss and question the themes, often going far beyond the passage and into much deeper matters of life and faith. Depending on the number of boys in residence, attendance varies between 2 and 5.

The Girl's Study, led by Sharon Barrett, uses a variety of resources. One study was a series on the theme of Grace, a very appropriate topic for the residents. In December, the girls again made nativity scenes. The girl's group typically has 1-3 attending. Due to renovations in the Girls' dormitory, there will be no female residents for 3 months beginning January 2024.

The residents love to sing, which is very therapeutic for residents and volunteers alike. Residents frequently request favourites that they sing throughout the week. At Christmas, we sang traditional Christmas Carols.

To close the evening we use a modified liturgy from the BAS with prayers, which are then forwarded to the Parish and are read again on Sunday. The evening closes after the singing of Amazing Grace.

A revival of Sunday Church attendance was attempted based on the availability of staff. Some staff and residents have recently attended the Men's Night dinners. A few parishioners have expressed an interest in volunteering at Portage. The Portage staff will develop a process to bring in new volunteers. Let one of the Team know if you are interested in supporting this continuing Ministry that has been part of St John's for over 30 years.

PWRDF



The year 2023 had hardly begun when we were woken up from our winter slumber by the news of the widespread and deadly earthquake in Southern Turkey and Northern Syria. Over 23,000 people were killed and endless others affected with loss of home and health, often with life changing injuries. PWRDF helped through ACT Alliance with blankets, tents and medicines for immediate relief.

However, this urgent situation could not let us forget the ongoing war in Ukraine. St. John's parishioners, through PWRDF and its partners, continued to care for the disabled, the traumatized children, the special needs of the Romani who had fled to Moldova, and the thousands who were helped with fuel and blankets through the cold winter.

The summer sharpened our awareness and responsiveness in a very different way. This time the needs were "right here" and not "out there". The devastating fires in Canada forced many communities to flee for their lives, leaving home and all belongings behind, and often losing them. PWRDF responded by establishing the in-Canada Emergency Response Fund, remaining true to its roots.

October 7 will be forever etched into our hearts and collective memory. Whether it is the slaughter in Israel or the ensuing relentless destruction of homes and killing of Palestinians in the Gaza Strip, the images haunt us and demand our response. Within a couple of days, PWRDF sent an additional grant to its long-term partner, the Al Ahli Arab Hospital in Gaza City, owned and operated by the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem. The hospital was repeatedly bombed and patients had to be evacuated, but at the time of writing this report, it is again serving the public, despite dangerous and precarious conditions and at great personal risk to staff, performing upwards of 20 surgeries per day. As PWRDF and its partners look to the future and longer-term support in the region, a single united proposal for a new six-month project, which will run from February 1, 2024, to July 31, 2024, has been designed in a partnership of Anglican agencies from Australia, New Zealand, UK, USA and Canada The Al Ahli Hospital and two other medical facilities and two educational projects with be the beneficiaries.

In frequent and regular letters and bulletin inserts, St. John's parishioners were kept abreast of the needs and the opportunities. You responded with abundant grace, generosity and open hands and hearts:

New Organ Console

We are very fortunate at St. John's to have an excellent organ, ideal for the requirements of a small parish church. The difficulty is that the scope and repertoire of our music program is more in line with that of a cathedral, stretching the resources of our instrument to the limits. It must also be pointed out that our old console was becoming more and more unreliable. With the 2012 addition of an electronic division, a generous legacy of David Rogers, it was decided that a three-manual console would be necessary to take full advantage of the resources at hand. Finding a suitable console has taken a number of years, but we were finally able to purchase one in 2022, for a sum of \$5000. The console, originally built in the 1990s, was stripped and refitted with state-of-the-art components, and installed in St. John's in August of 2023.

Among the many highlights for music at St. John's this past year:

- Welcoming new core members into the Parish Choir: Jennifer Krabbe, Rachel Barreca, and Sharang Sharma
- Founding the Elora Children's Choir under the direction of Kate Wright with a dedicated group of 20 young singers! The children's choir sang their first concert this past November with the Centre Wellington Singers and looks forward to singing at several church services and another concert this coming winter and spring.
- Establishing the Concert Series as an integral part of our musical outreach. Our first season included nine events that highlighted the soloistic talents of Parish Choir singers in several recitals, brought in new audiences for a community outreach concert by the Parish Choir, and (in the fall) supported musicians from the former Kitchener-Waterloo Symphony.
- The new Bach Meditations series exploring the sacred cantatas of J.S. Bach and combining music, worship, and reflection in creative ways.
- The Song Circle, led by Stan Litch, which has engaged a whole new group of people in friendly and supportive singing together every Friday.
- A collaborative service between the volunteer choir and Parish Choir on Good Friday, which we will continue in spirit in 2024 with the new Easter Vigil service.
- Securing upcoming choral commissions in 2024 from Canadian composer Sarah Quartel and in 2025 from British composer Roderick Williams.
- Continuing many of our new musical outreach initiatives from 2022, including the Compline service and Christmas carolling at Elora homes.

OPEN DOORS

Our church has been discussing the need for accessible facilities for almost forty years and it should come as no surprise, our electrical, plumbing and HVAC systems are failing. Doing nothing is no longer an option.

In October 2022 our spirits were buoyed at Special Vestry when parishioners unanimously approved a motion to explore the cost and legislative approvals required to expedite improvements. This decision aligned with our missional priorities: Open Doors, Engage & Involve, Proclaim the Love of Christ and Musical Outreach.

Using a concept drawing which included accessible washrooms, a kitchen and gathering space, a preliminary Class "D" budget estimate was calculated in collaboration with our architect Edward Thomas and comparable building projects in the region.

In the Spring of 2023 consulting firms were retained to prepare technical reports in anticipation of seeking input and approvals through The Township of Centre Wellington.

In the Fall, reports were presented to the Town's Heritage Committee and Committee of Adjustment. Both Committees unanimously approved St. John's project for Council's approval. Currently, the project resides with the Planning Department. We've been told to expect a 4-6 month delay for approvals due to the backlog of requests for building permits. This pause allows us time to complete other important work.

Throughout the year, more than 80 parishioners, Heritage Committee representatives, Mayor and Members of Council, participated in five different information sessions and walkabouts with the architect. In November-December 2023, Open Door Committee Members met one-on-one with 30+ households. The vast majority of parishioners supported the project in principle and many pledged generous financial support. Some provided very thoughtful and relevant recommendations regarding programming and finances.

In January 2024, on the advice of experienced mentors like Ken Edwards, John Spearn and James Prichard, we reviewed the original budget and committed to "sharpening our pencils."



Open Doors Co-Chairs Peter Barr and Colleen Murray invited architect Edward Thomas to meet onsite with engineers and cost estimators from The Zehr Group to discuss a Class "C" budget estimate.

A Class "C" Estimate is being prepared because we're committed to understanding the detailed specifications and associated costs for all disciplines (architectural, mechanical, electrical and structural) before returning to Special Vestry seeking further approval to proceed.

Meanwhile, we continue to work with Diocesan staff, the Trillium Foundation and grant writers to source, apply and secure funds for the project.

With the assistance of Columbarium Administrator Pat Ellis and Diocesan representative Brian Culp (Niagara Diocese) we're negotiating approvals through the Bereavement Authority of Ontario, should the columbarium need to be moved elsewhere on church property.

Eventually, a Class "B" budget will be prepared. At this stage detailed design for all disciplines (architectural, mechanical, electrical and structural) will be documented and another Special Vestry will be called. The estimated timing is December 2024 - January 2025. Parishioners will be asked to review the project and vote on proceeding to Call For Tenders.

The final stage (Class "A") will be attained when tendered bids for the Open Doors project are received, evaluated and verified.

The Rector reminded Vestry of Zoom etiquette and asked Vestry to remain muted unless they had a speaking role. As most of the votes are procedural, the Chair will only ask for opposition to the motions and abstentions.

7. Motion to Adopt Minutes: February 27, 2022; December 4, 2022

Moved by Ian Hornsby and Seconded by Marcus Kramer that the minutes from the Vestry meeting held on February 27, 2022 and the Special Vestry held on December 4, 2022 be approved. CARRIED

8. Looking back at 2022

a. Adopt Reports of Ministry for 2022

Highlights:

- i. Guinevere Kern spoke about the Calls to Action Reading Group, which began out of wondering how to move forward in thinking about Reconciliation. The group began in October and the goal is to read through the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action in a thoughtful, prayerful, and intentional way with an eye to learning and unlearning.
- ii. Pam Gradwell spoke about the sacristy renovation. Thanks to the generous donation from Elizabeth Litch, the frontals and superfrontals are now stored properly (flat instead of hanging), and the space has been much improved.
- iii. Colleen Murray spoke about the Poppy Project and the reach it has had on social media. The Parish Choir's video for the Poppy Project has received 2,500 views on social media.
- b. Motion to Adopt Financial Statements for 2022
 - i. The Treasurer, Andrew Hirst, led Vestry through the financials for 2022. St John's is in a very strong financial position, and our investments sit at \$5.3 million. A significant principal donation from the Ellen Pearson Estate has put the investment portfolio in a relatively even position despite a 10% market drop.
 - ii. Donations for 2022 were \$231,000 to the general fund and \$72,000 to the choir fund. Transfers from the investments continue to offset the donation shortfall.
 - iii. Payroll increased in 2022, which reflects increased choir activity.
 - iv. Property costs also increased due to the purchase of a new organ console and a full year of being open to the public.
 - v. Our diocesan assessment decreased by \$13,000
 - vi. There was an extraordinary cost required to settle an legal matter in the amount of \$60,000.

Chris Houston noted that it would be ideal if we could mirror our Visioning statement into the budget somehow.

Moved by Jon Warland and Seconded by Jane Houlding that the Financial Statements for 2022 be approved. **CARRIED**

c. Welcoming New People to St John's in 2022

Vestry provides an opportunity to welcome new members to St John's Elora. All of these people first encountered St John's online. The Rector welcomed Thelma Roswell, Joyce Reimer and Walter Gosk, Yung Chang-Ho, Ted and Lisa Arnott, Jim Wilson and Jane McKinnon Wilson, Melanie and Russ Reed, and Wayne Jessop.

Joyce Reimer spoke on behalf of the newcomers to St John's to say that they have felt welcomed (especially by Patricia Reimer and David Campbell), and that they are nourished by the spirituality, joy, and music at St John's.

New members were welcomed by the Rector with a prayer.

9. Looking forward to 2023

a. Vision for St John's: Four Priorities: Proclaim the Love of Christ; Engage and Involve; Musical Outreach; Open Doors

The first two priorities (Proclaim the Love of Christ and Engage and Involve) are fundamental to what we do. Musical Outreach is our charism at St John's, and Open Doors is a place where we want to live more fully.

Peter Barr provided an update to the Open Doors project. We have retained S&M Architects and they have provided conceptual drawings for a space that will be open to us and the community. The goal is that the new construction will give light and life to the first three priorities. The Bishop has given her initial approval for us to move forward with the Open Doors project, and we are in the official process with the diocese and the required committees.

The Open Doors committee is meeting this week and it will launch an investigative process to discern what the community needs. The committee is also consulting with the municipality.

Chris Houston encouraged Vestry to consider the rest of the vision and its implication on space. He also encouraged Vestry to consider some of the other priorities that will be competing for time, money, and attention.

b. Motion to Adopt Budget for 2023

The Treasurer lead Vestry through the Budget for 2023 which includes investment withdrawals for specific capital expenses, notably the new organ console installation, upgraded camera and recording equipment, and the Open Doors project. The Wardens have also budgeted for a curate to potentially begin in the fall, the expenses of a full choir for a full year, and for a full year for the Parish Administrator. A deficit of \$143,000 will be covered by withdrawals from the investment funds.

Peter Huck suggested setting an upper limit of what percentage of Parish operating expenses will be covered by investments.

Colleen Murray asked if there were diocesan guidelines to help us with that. Colleen also noted that a relatively small percentage of parish donations come from Pre-Authorized Giving. Members of Vestry are encouraged to give through PAG. Chris Houston encouraged Vestry to consider commercial ventures to support the Parish's vision.

Peter Barr noted that there were no restrictions or guidelines from the diocese about the use of investments. Peter also noted that the Parish has historically determined that we would not use more than 80% of our annual investment interest income. The last several years have been about 60%, allowing 40% of the interest to be reinvested as principal.

Moved by Peter Barr and Seconded by Pam Gradwell that the 2023 Budget be adopted. CARRIED

- c. Leadership for 2023
 - i. Motion by Vestry to Elect Parish Leaders for 2023


